Calgary Peace Prize Winner, Dr. Izzeldin Abuelaish, the Gaza Doctor Author of "I Shall Not Hate" March 8, 2012 at the Calgary Country Club

The 2012 Calgary Peace Prize recipient presented a truly inspiring talk at the 5th Annual Peace Prize dinner, organized and hosted by the Consortium for Peace Studies at the University of Calgary. Dr. Abuelaish began by commenting that he wished he could share this award with his wife and daughters. In September of 2008, he lost his wife to leukemia. A few short months later, on January 16, 2009, 3 of his daughters and a niece were killed when an Israeli shell hit their bedroom. Despite these tragedies, Dr. Abuelaish determined not to be a victim of hatred. He feels that hate is destructive and will only cause more violence and heartache.

His talk was full of hope for humankind—he spoke of the need to free ourselves from the sense of 'otherness', to get to know people, connect with people, and to learn about their lives, rather than making judgements on the basis of 'difference'. He said that we were all born free, therefore no one should be killed nor need to pay for their own freedom.

He also spoke about the importance of dreaming, that even though people may be imprisoned, no one can stop another from dreaming. His own dream was achieved by becoming a doctors, something that he dreamed about as a child. He believes wholeheartedly that medicine has one face and one culture - human - and the practicing of medicine is a means of achieving peace.

Dr. Abuelaish stressed the importance of women as the centre of society. He believes in investing in girls' education, and has started a Canadian charity called "Daughters for Life" that gives scholarship to girls throughout the Middle East. He mentioned that healthy, educated women will raise healthy children for a healthy society, and that women are our biggest hope.

"You must have hope and have faith—but hope and faith without action have no meaning. We must work for a free, bright future for our children."

Netanyahu, Harper threaten Iran

Israel's Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu was in Ottawa recently promoting a pre-emptive military attack upon Iran. He visited with his friend and close ally Stephen Harper prior to going to Washington in an attempt to pressure President Obama into supporting his doomsday scenario. Contenders for the Republican nomination were only too happy to beat the same war drum. In Canada, Mr. Harper earlier had obligingly gone out of his way to tell journalists that Iran was the largest single threat to the world's future and security.

Harper said he had "watched and listened to what the leadership in the Iran regime says, and it frightens me." Our bold warrior would do well to heed the words and actions of Douglas Roche, Murray Thomson and Ernie Regehr. I'll get back to their plan in a minute. They are wiser by far than our in-temperate leaders.

Attack Iran

Netanyahu, along with his Conservative and Republican cheerleaders, wants to attack Iran because they say it is developing a capacity to build nuclear weapons. There have already been several assassinations carried out on Iranian scientists working in the nuclear program. The obvious perpetrator is Israel and that country has not even bothered to categorically deny its involvement – preferring to warn of more to come. Think, for a moment, of what the response would be if Israeli, American or Canadian scientists were assassinated on their home soil.

False claims

Is Iran developing nuclear weapons as is claimed by the Israelis and Mr. Harper? It may be, and if so that is, indeed, cause for alarm. But we should by now be wary of false claims. George W. Bush, Dick Cheney and Donald Rumsfeld claimed to have proof that Iraq was developing nuclear weapons as well and they used that information to launch a ruinous war in 2003. Hans Blix and other inspectors from the [International Atomic Energy Agency](#) were on the ground in Iraq, where they found nothing. They begged for more time to carry out their inspections but were ridiculed by the Bush administration. The claims made by Bush, Cheney and Rumsfeld turned out to be bald-faced lies. In an international system based on justice rather than on the power that accrues to victors, one or all of these gentlemen might today be in The Hague facing accusations of being war criminals.

20,000 weapons

Let us assume that Iran is on a path toward producing a nuclear weapon. If so, that should be opposed – and is – through diplomatic pressure and an economic boycott that is reportedly biting deeply. But let's provide some context here. The [Federation of American Scientists](#) says there are almost 20,000 nuclear weapons in the world. [Scott Taylor](#) a former Canadian soldier who writes knowledgeably on military affairs, says, "In an international context, the nuclear-armed community, led by the U.S., has a collective arsenal capable of wiping out the entire planet several times over." There are nine countries that possess nuclear weapons, including Israel, which has an estimated 200 nuclear warheads and the missile systems with which to deliver them. Mr. Netanyahu never talks about that and refuses to even discuss it. Surely a nuclear Israel must frighten its neighbours in the Middle East and destabilize the region.

A world divided

Debbie Grisdale of Ottawa, who serves on the board for the ecumenical peace group Project Ploughshares, says, "Currently the world is divided into countries that can have nuclear weapons — and think that it is their right to possess them — and those countries that cannot have them. Why is it okay for some countries to have them and others not? The complete elimination of nuclear weapons, at the very least a treaty banning them – would mean that is not okay for any country to have nuclear weapons. The world has a treaty banning chemical and one banning biological weapons – why not nuclear weapons?"

Sling shot vs machine guns

Let us again assume that Iran is on the path to developing a weapon. what does that mean in perspective? Here is Scott Taylor's analysis: "Should Iran someday soon produce enough enriched uranium to create one nuclear warhead, and someday soon acquire a missile delivery system with intercontinental capability, it would then possess a single threat to international targets, including North America.

"It is like a showdown between a solitary gunman holding a single-shot pistol against a heavily armed gang toting machine guns. In such a case, it would be suicidal for Iran to initiate hostilities."

Taylor says that when this scenario was pointed out to Prime Minister Harper it did nothing to change his analysis. "I'm not sure that would dissuade them," Harper reportedly said. "We're dealing with a fanatical and dangerous regime."

In other words, we are the good guys. They are the fanatics. Or at John Baird, the foreign affairs minister, said in his recent visit to Israel – they are the black hats and we are the white hats.

Thankfully, President Obama is not accepting these simplistic truisms as analysis. At a news conference during Netanyahu's visit to Washington, Obama warned against the "loose talk of war" and talked of the need to give diplomacy a chance. But it is an election year, and he is being derided as a wimp and prodded into action by Republican warmongers and the pro-Israel lobby.

Peace elders

I spoke above of three wise elders. They are Murray Thomson of Ottawa, Ernie Regehr of Waterloo and Douglas Roche of Edmonton. All three are eminent citizens and recipients of the Order of Canada, our most distinguished award for public service. They have convinced [552 recipients of the Order to sign a letter](#) calling on the Canadian government to take the lead in urging international negotiations to achieve a Nuclear Weapons Convention – a verifiable treaty on the prohibition and elimination of those weapons. Some of their fellow Order of Canada recipients supporting this call include Margaret Atwood, Roméo Dallaire, Stephen Lewis, David Suzuki and Jean Vanier.

These are dangerous times. While our Prime Minister and Israel's talk about attacking Iran, Thomson, Roche and Regehr are on another track – they say get rid of nuclear weapons altogether. They are the "white hats" as far as I am concerned.

Canadian-made arms used in Saudi crackdown on anti-government protests in neighbouring Bahrain

Canadian arms companies were given free rein last year as the federal government tripled the amount of military weapons and ammunition licensed for export to foreign countries to more than \$12 billion. The largest benefactor at \$4 billion was Saudi Arabia, which is believed to have used Canadian-made armoured vehicles to help put down anti-government protests in neighbouring Bahrain during the early days of the Arab Spring.

The government figures, tabled in the House of Commons a few weeks ago, do not say exactly what Canadian-made arms the government approved for export or how much was actually delivered. But the total in government-approved arms export licences for Saudi Arabia was more than 100 times the \$35 million approved in 2010.



The Middle Eastern kingdom also has quietly purchased hundreds of LAV-3s armoured vehicles from General Dynamics Land Systems in London, Ont., over the years and was expected to receive more than 700 last year. The LAV-3s are synonymous in Canada with this country's combat mission to Afghanistan, where the wheeled, armoured vehicles earned their stripes as the military's main workhorse. Video and photos shot by protesters and media outlets in March 2011 showed Saudi troops using LAV-3s to suppress the protests.

In announcing this past June that General Dynamics Land Systems had been awarded a contract to provide up to 82 more LAV-3s to Saudi Arabia, the U.S. Defense Co-operation Agency wrote the deal would "serve to make a key strategic partner - more capable of defeating those who would threaten regional stability and less reliant on the deployment of U.S. forces to maintain or restore stability in the Middle East."

Saudi Arabia also has a poor human-rights record, with laws discriminating against women and religious minorities as well as bans on public protests and free speech. "Saudi Arabia responded with unflinching repression to demands by citizens for greater democracy in the wake of the pro-democracy Arab Spring movements," reads a recent Human Rights Watch report.

The United Kingdom and Australia were second and third after Saudi Arabia getting weapons and ammunition at \$3.5 billion and \$1 billion, respectively. The government also approved \$58 million in arms exports to Afghanistan - bringing the total since 2006 to more than \$500 million - as well as \$20 million to Egypt, \$60 million to Jamaica and \$149 million to South Africa.

The figures do not include exports to Canada's largest arms customer, the U.S., because arms companies do not require licences for that trade. The government also has approved more than \$44 billion in so-called "dual-use" exports to China, which include any goods or technology that can be used for both peaceful and military purposes. This is believed to be primarily uranium and other nuclear-related products.

Arms control activist Ken Epps said that while the Conservative government has ended the practice of tabling annual reports on Canadian arms sales, the country has consistently ranked among the top 15 countries, and often breaks into the top 10. But Canada has an obligation to ensure it doesn't sell arms to countries with poor human-rights records, he said, or governments that will use the weapons against civilians.

"The LAV-3 and other similar vehicles that Canada has supplied to the Saudi Arabian National Guard are exactly the kind of equipment that would be used to put down demonstrations and used against civilian populations," he said. "I think this is an example of where economic expediency has overridden the guidelines."
