

Happy New Year.


When I took office one year ago, I appealed for 2017 to be a year for peace.

Rosalie Abella — Calgary Peace Prize Recipient 2018

Justice Abella was appointed to the Supreme Court of Canada in 2004. She is the first Jewish woman appointed to the Court.

She attended the University of Toronto, where she earned a B.A. in 1967 and an LL.B. in 1970. In 1964 she graduated from the Royal Conservatory of Music in classical piano. She was called to the Ontario Bar in 1972 and practiced civil and criminal litigation until 1976 when she was appointed to the Ontario Family Court at the age of 29, the youngest and first pregnant person appointed to the judiciary in Canada. She was appointed to the Ontario Court of Appeal in 1992.

She was the sole Commissioner of the 1984 federal Royal Commission on Equality in Employment, creating the term and concept of "employment equity". The theories of "equality" and "discrimination" she developed in her Report were adopted by the Supreme Court of Canada in its first decision dealing with equality rights under the *Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms* in 1989. The report has been implemented by the of Canada, New Zealand, Northern Ireland and South Africa. She

subsequently served as Chair of the Ontario Labour Relations Board (1984 to 1989), Chair of the Ontario Law Reform Commission (1989 to 1992), and Boulton Visiting Professor at the Faculty of Law of McGill University (1988 to 1992). She also served as a commissioner on the Ontario Human Rights Commission; as a member of the Ontario Public Service Labour Relations Tribunal; as Co-Chair of the University of Toronto Academic Discipline Tribunal; as a member of the Premier's Advisory Committee on Confederation; and as Chair of the Study on Access to Legal Services by the Disabled.

She has written over 90 articles and written or co-edited four books. She was made a Senior Fellow of Massey College in 1989, a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada in 1997, and a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 2007. She has given, among others, the Harlan Lecture at Princeton, the Ryan Lecture at Georgetown, the Winchester Lecture at Oxford, the Anderson Lecture at Yale, and was the Bullock Chair at the Hebrew University, the Mackenzie King Distinguished Visiting Professor at Harvard, the Floersheimer Distinguished Jurist in Residence at Cardozo, a Distinguished Visiting Faculty at the University of Toronto Law School, and Bright International Jurist in Residence at the University of Hawaii School of Law.


She was a judge of the Giller Literary Prize; Chair of the Rhodes Selection Committee for Ontario; director of the Institute for Research on Public Policy; moderator of the English Language Leaders' Debate in 1988; a member of the Canadian Judicial Council's Inquiry on Donald Marshall, Jr.; Program Chair of the Governor General's Canadian Study Conference; Chief Rapporteur in Halifax and Co-Chair in Vancouver of the 1992 Renewal of Canada Conferences; Trustee of the McGill Institute for the Study of Canada; Governor of the International Board of Governors of the Hebrew University; and Vice-Chair of the Board of Governors of the National Judicial Institute.

Justice Abella has been active in Canadian judicial education, organizing the first judicial seminar in which all evels of the judiciary participated, the first judicial seminar in which persons outside the legal profession were invited to participate, the first national education program for administrative tribunals, and the first national conference for Canada's female judges.

Justice Abella was awarded the Distinguished Alumnus Award of the University of Toronto Faculty of Law; the Distinguished Service Award of the Canadian Bar Association (Ontario); the International Justice Prize of the Peter Gruber Foundation; the Human Relations Award of the Canadian Council of Christians and Jews; the Honourable Walter S. Tarnopolsky Human Rights Award; and the Bora Laskin Award for Distinguished Service in Labour Law. She has 37 honourary degrees.

Justice Abella was born in a Displaced Person's Camp in Stuttgart, Germany on July 1, 1946. Her family came to Canada as refugees in 1950. She is the daughter of Jacob and Fanny Silberman. She is married to Canadian historian Irving Abella and they have two sons, Jacob and Zachary, both lawyers.

Hawaii false alarm: a nuclear wake-up call

At one point or another, when confronted by a drop-down menu on a computer screen, just about everyone has chosen the wrong option. It's usually a trivial mistake, easily corrected, that momentarily selects shoes that are too big or a one-way flight instead of round-trip. Last Saturday at 8.05am, an operator at the Hawaii Emergency Management Agency inadvertently chose "missile alert" instead of "test missile alert", setting off sirens across the state, sending messages to thousands of phones that implied a nuclear attack, broadcasting similar warnings on radio and television, and scaring the hell out of a lot of people.

Unlike most drop-down menus, however, this one lacked an option to correct the mistake. There was "no cancellation button", a spokesman for the emergency agency told *The Washington Post*. As a result, it took almost 40 minutes for the system to reassure the public that

ballistic missiles were not on their way to Honolulu.

In the realm of nuclear accidents and false alarms, the Hawaii event wasn't especially serious or dangerous. It involved a civilian, not a military, early warning system. But it shared a common cause with accidents that could have proven truly catastrophic: a seemingly trivial but unanticipated error disrupting the workings of a complex technological system.

Moreover, no country is safe from the nuclear threat. The effects of a nuclear detonation show little respect for national borders. A relatively small nuclear war between India and Pakistan, involving about one hundred weapons, would have worldwide atmospheric effects and cause hundreds of millions of casualties.

William J. Perry, who served as secretary of defence during the Clinton administration, believes the threat of a deliberate or accidental nuclear catastrophe is greater today than it was during the Cold War. More than a decade ago, Perry joined former US senator Sam Nunn and two former secretaries of state, Henry Kissinger and George P. Shultz, in calling for the abolition of nuclear weapons. Then-president Barack Obama later endorsed their support for abolition and the International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons (ICAN) won last year's Nobel Peace Prize for seeking that goal.

The alternative to abolishing nuclear weapons is fully embracing the faith that machines will always work perfectly, computers will never go wrong, and nobody will ever push the wrong button. The last nuclear weapon to detonate on Australian soil – the Taranaki test at Maralinga on October 9, 1957 – had an explosive force almost twice as strong as that of the bomb that destroyed Hiroshima. Unless there is a worldwide campaign to eliminate these weapons, with massive demonstrations like the ones that helped to end the Cold War peacefully, Taranaki may turn out not to be the last one, after all.

We, the undersigned, **residents of Canada**, call upon the **Government of Canada** to sign and ratify the United Nations Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons.

Winner Announced: 2017 Arms Control Persons of the Year

(Washington, D.C.)—Diplomats from the disarmament delegations of Austria, Brazil, Ireland, Mexico, New Zealand, and South Africa, and Ambassador Elayne Whyte Gómez of Costa Rica received the highest number of votes in an online poll to determine the "2017 Arms Control Persons of the Year" in recognition of their efforts to secure the historic 2017 UN Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons.

The diplomats leading the disarmament delegations from Austria, Brazil, Ireland, Mexico, New Zealand, and South Africa were part of the "core group" of states who, along with the president of the negotiating conference, Ambassador Elayne Whyte Gómez of Costa Rica, played a central role in the multilateral talks on the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons. The negotiations were brought to a successful conclusion in July and the treaty was opened for signature in September.


