Please mark your calendars and join us to hear **Jen Sidorova**, a PhD candidate at the University of Calgary, whose research focuses on Indigenous populations in Siberia. The first part of the talk will highlight Indigenous peoples in Siberia, the way that the Russian empire defined them, and how the Soviet government divided them into larger autonomous nations and smaller numbered nations. The second part of the talk will focus on the Soviet policy of assimilation and its prohibition of shamanism and shaman practices.

- Munk Debates cancels foreign policy event because Trudeau won't attend. Although the other three major party leaders said they would attend, organizers of a foreign-policy election debate that was scheduled for Oct. 1 cancelled the event because Liberal leader Justin Trudeau won't participate. Rudyard Griffiths, chair of the Munk Debates, said no one had a bigger impact on foreign policy over the last four years than Mr. Trudeau. Ploughshares Calgary regrets this cancellation as there are many key issues in this area that need to be addressed. Griffith's noted in a statement, "Regrettably, the prime minister's refusal to attend our debate has denied Canadians the only real opportunity they had in this election to see his foreign policy record challenged in a substantive and sustained fashion."
